OUR CONSERVATION CLOISTER

Since the purchase of our new land in 2016, there's been a new consciousness of our surroundings at Hilfield. It's a special environment, set in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty with 2 nature reserves bordering our land. We have woods, wildflower meadows and grazing land which we manage sustainably, and our neighbours are also engaged in caring for the natural environment.

But do all of our visitors know all of this? Do they know what to see? What wildlife shares our space here? How can we open the eyes of our visitors to 'see' what is around us here—and more importantly, to 'see' what might be around them in their own home situations?

So, in March, we launched our 'Conservation Cloister' along one wall of the courtyard. It is, as yet, under construction, but it is developing by the day. There is a bird 'sightings board' where all of us, community and visitors, are encouraged to write down what birds they have seen and where they saw them; a map with information about the land, and what you might currently see; and the brand new Spring Trail is available—a suggested short walk though the land, for all to use. All the information is available on-line also, so that everyone can stay in touch with the seasonal wonders of our environment.







The Hilfield Community

The "Conservation Cloister" at Hilfield is purposely placed next to the Chapel door. This juxtaposition of information about different animals and plants with sacred texts and spiritual worship is an essential part of our Franciscan ethos. What do house martins,

goldfinches, roe deer, badgers, lichens and orchids have to do with the Gospel? We believe that every aspect of creation shows forth the glory of God and has an important part to play in the flourishing God intends for each of us. Humans are endowed with the unique responsibility to preserve, connect with, and protect creation especially because we have the unique ability to exploit and destroy it.

As we enter the chapel we collect ourselves for worship and prayer; the Conservation Cloister can give us names and stories, make our concern focused and radical via an informed, intimate perspective. As we intercede for the whole of creation, we offer ourselves to be stewards of the environment around us.

What you see in the Cloister is a beginning. We want to develop the presentation, make it more interactive. We welcome your ideas and help!

We started some wildlife surveys this spring; all results will be posted on the board in the Conservation Cloister, and also on our website.

Moth surveys: Michael Sammes

is helping us set up a moth trap every second month; we have had 2 surveys so far; on the second, we recorded over 32 different species of moths.



Bird surveys: Lydia led our first bird survey in March, using a protocol for observation which we'll keep to during the season. Daniel ran a second survey in April, and on 24th May we will do a third, with the help of Bob and Julia Hicks.

Neighbours and Nest Boxes From Richard, our Land Manager

One of the most exciting upshots from our purchase of the new land is how it connects neighbours with similar conservation interests, like the missing piece of a jigsaw. Together we've formed the 'High Stoy Conservation Cluster Group'. We offer encouragement, advice and practical support to one another as well as developing a landscape scale approach to conservation. An early expression of this fledgling project is erecting nest boxes. A neighbour donated some tit boxes for us to share, and we will produce some for owls. We have also put up some House Martin boxes, a rapidly declining species, one of Arocha's "Target Ten" for Partners in Action (like the Friary.) Both these relationships help us coordinate our practical efforts and encourage one another incubating a narrative of hope.
